Dr. Karkoszka served in Poland as Secretary of State – First Deputy Minister of National Defense, 1995-97, then as Acting Minister of National Defense, Nov.–Dec. 1996; he was Deputy Chairman of the Polish Team for NATO accession negotiations, 1997; Professor of Central European Security at the George C. Marshall European Security Studies Center, Garmisch-Partenkirchen, 1988–2000 before he joined DCAF in October 2000; until October 2004 he was Senior Political Advisor to the DCAF Director.

MARENIN, Otwin:

Otwin Marenin is a professor in the Political Science Department and Director of the Criminal Justice Program at Washington State University. He received his BS from Northern Arizona University and his MA and Ph.D. (in Comparative Politics) from UCLA. He has taught at Ahmadu Bello University and the University of Benin in Nigeria, and the Universities of Baltimore, California, Colorado, and Alaska-Fairbanks in the United States. His research and publications have focused on policing systems in Native American communities in the United States and on the origins and practices of policing in Africa, especially in Nigeria. More recently, he has done research and written on developments in international policing, transnational police assistance programs, and efforts to reform the policing systems in failed, transitional, and developing states. Recent publications include Policing Change, Changing Police: International Perspectives (editor), Challenges of Policing Democracies (coeditor Dilip Das), and Transforming the Police in Central and Eastern Europe (coeditor Marina Caparini).

MATEI, Mihaela:

Mihaela Matei is the head of the Strategic Affairs Directorate in the Romanian Ministry of National Defense. She joined the Ministry of Defense in 1997 and was appointed consecutively as head of the Defense Policy Section in the Integrated Defense Planning Directorate, head of the Division for Security and Defense Policies, and head of the Strategic Affairs Directorate.
