The program at Stanford, launched in September 2001, focuses on electricity and gas markets worldwide. Dr. Victor teaches international environmental politics in the Political Science Department at Stanford University and energy law at Stanford Law School.

Previously, Dr. Victor directed the Science and Technology program at the Council on Foreign Relations, where he studied the sources of technological innovation and the impact of innovation on economic growth. His research also examined global forest policy, global warming, and genetic engineering of food crops. He is author of numerous essays and articles in scholarly journals and magazines and newspapers, including *Climatic Change, The Financial Times, Foreign Affairs, International Journal of Hydrogen Energy, Nature, The New York Times, Scientific American*, and *The Washington Post*.
