On the Record: Mourning Usama bin Laden

May 4, 2011

The following is a sampling of reactions from various Islamist leaders, commentators, and organizations following the death of Usama bin Laden.

Lashkar-e-Taiba (Pakistani Militant Group)

"Usama bin Laden was a great person who awakened the Muslim world...Martyrdoms are not losses, but are a matter of pride for Muslims...Usama bin Laden has rendered great sacrifices for Islam and Muslims, and these will always be remembered."
